Salt Lake County Library Services is pleased to present the annual One County, One Book program, when all Salt Lake County adults are encouraged to read the same extraordinary book, creating a countywide discussion at all county libraries. The 2014 selection is the award-winning book Ordinary Grace by William Kent Krueger. Ordinary Grace is set in New Bremen, Minnesota in 1961. For 13-year-old Frank Drum it was a grim summer in which death visited frequently and assumed many forms. He begins the season preoccupied with the concerns of any teenage boy, but when tragedy unexpectedly strikes his family, he finds himself thrust into an adult world full of secrets, lies, adultery and betrayal, suddenly called upon to demonstrate a maturity and gumption beyond his years.


